1st Duffus Rainbows

In September we decided that we would continue our Rainbows by emailing out the 'At Home' badge challenges and ask the girls for photo or video evidence of them completing these challenges - what a lot of creative and inventive families and girls we have at Duffus.

Our Rainbows were excited to receive their Covid 19 guiding badges in the post, as a reminder of the time they had spent together with their families during Covid19.



Our first 'At Home' badge challenge was for the 'Express Myself' Drawing Interest Badge. For part 1 the girls were asked to draw a self-portrait of themselves.





For part 2 the girls had to draw anything they wanted but the challenge was to make it BIG, and our Rainbows certainly did that and the final part of this challenge was for the girls to draw 'the impossible' thinking about their senses and emotions.

Even although we were not able to be part of our usual Remembrance Day Service at Hopeman we still had our own special Ceremony at Duffus Church. The Rev Jenny Adams asked if our Rainbows could collect and appropriately decorate their own stone and lay it outside Duffus Church to form a small Remembrance Day Cairn. One of our Rainbows volunteered to put a wooden Cross at the Duffus Church Memorial on Remembrance Sunday. These photos were added to the Hopeman online church service. We were very proud of our girls and their families for being part of this community event.





Again, our Rainbows were delighted to receive their Remembrance Day Guiding Badge for participating in this event.

Some of our Rainbows took part in the Children in Need 'Act Your Age' Challenge. Some of the girls' ideas included cycling for 6 minutes and creating 6 different moves on outdoor equipment- another badge for our families to sew on their daughter's tabard





At the end of November, we completed part 2 of our 'Take Action' Helper Interest Badge which we had started before the first lockdown. This part was entitled 'Help Your Community' and we suggested that the girls might like to donate toys or clothes to a charity shop or a food item to Moray Foodbank or instead of buying themselves a treat maybe buy something for Moray Foodbank with their treat money. What a lot of kind-hearted families we have in our Rainbows. The girls completed this badge in April with the final challenge to find a way to help our world and living things. To help the girls achieve this we sent each Rainbow a packet of seeds to plant to attract bees and butterflies to their garden.

We started 2021 with a new 'At Home Badge Challenge': 'Have Adventures' Agility Interest Badge. For part 1 the girls were asked to create their own 'warm up' and 'cool down' movements to share with their family and friends to use before and after exercising. One of our Rainbows created a theme for this 'Bonnie going on a dog walk with Rosie' and another gave all her movements a name.





For part 2 of this badge the girls were asked to create an indoor or outdoor obstacle course. Again, Bonnie created a story for this challenge where she was a dragon on a mission to get the Diamond of the Jungle. Her first obstacle was balancing on towels trying to avoid being bitten by the snakes.

For part 3 of this badge the girls were asked to try a new activity or sport. One Rainbow had the good idea to try litter picking with her grandad's litter pickers. They used them at Lossiemouth cemetery and beach and Duffus Castle and she and her family are going to carry on doing this in the future. This year for Thinking Day some of our girls joined the Girlguiding Virtual event on Sunday 21st February. One of the popular activities was seeing how many socks they could put on one foot in a minute.

In June some of our girls joined the Rainbow and Brownie Virtual Fun Day hosted by Girlguiding Moray which involved participating in different activities including making marionettes and juggling balls.

Although it has been a different year for Duffus Rainbows we have really appreciated our family's support and enjoyed seeing all the photos and video evidence of them completing their different badges and participating in community events. Both the leaders and the girls are looking forward to seeing each other again in person when we restart in September.


We made our promise virtually and then set out to start our first bit of program: Influence Stage one. The girls shared with us all about the people who help them and about the things they care about.

We completed activities for International Women's Day and Easter. This included making our own hot cross buns.




During the summer we held a unit sunflower growing competition. Some of them grew very tall. Alison's seeds unfortunately didn't survive the attention of her cat.

Trefoil guilds across Moray have kept in contact by telephone and email, while working independently on the 'STARS' challenge and online quizzes.


Many have bravely mastered technologies unfamiliar to them and can return to a more normal programme with new skills under their belts.


